uth did not belong in Israel. She was from Moab. She married an Israelite when his family moved to her nation to avoid a famine. She was left in a bad circumstance when her husband and her husband's father and brother died. Now it was Naomi, Ruth, and Orpah—three women alone. It was a grave thing to be a woman with no husband in that culture, so Naomi told her daughters-in-law to return to their own people, as Naomi intended to do to hers, to Bethlehem of Judah. The daughter-inlaw, Orpah, did return to her people. Ruth, however, refused, declaring determined allegiance, not only to Naomi but to her people and to the true God. Ruth was more than just loyal to Naomi. Her intent was to forsake her family and to attach herself to the people of God. Certainly she must have loved Naomi, but this kind of commitment to Israel and to God, by a foreigner, was a near certain path to poverty. But God would bless her loyalty.

When Ruth and Naomi returned to Bethlehem. they were in the position of little more than beggars. Ruth gleaned in the fields of Boaz, a near relative to Naomi. Boaz noticed Ruth's faithfulness to both Naomi and God. As a close relative of Naomi's, Boaz could be expected to take responsibility for the care of Ruth and Naomi. And Boaz proved he was willing to marry Ruth. His redemption and marriage to Ruth led to her occupying a place in David's, and eventually Jesus's, ancestry.

The redemption of Ruth by Boaz is more than a touching story of love and compassion. Boaz is certainly a type of Christ, pointing to Jesus, our Redeemer. Boaz went beyond the call of duty to show his love and concern for Ruth, as Jesus did for sinners who would repent and turn to Him.


What if your friend couldn't understand why so many bad things were happening? What if she asks you why God has forgotten her? **What could you say?**
